Early Intervention Services

We hope that the new year finds you refreshed and ready to try new things to make positive change for your program, its children, families, and staff.

Here are the topics we covered last year "**In the Loop**", How many have you tried? How many would you like to implement in the new year? In the words of our Early Intervention Specialist, Kim Kohler, here is your "**Start Fresh Refresher**"!

- **Reduce expulsions due to challenging behavior**. Call us at the first signs for support. If you must expel, use the correct codes in the portal so we can help the family and child.
- Focus on teaching children problem solving skills.
- Self-care for teachers and understanding your "hot buttons" and what to do when they are pushed.
- Teach children about feelings.
- Teach children **self-regulation strategies** like the Tucker Turtle Technique! Schedule or register for an onsite Tucker Turtle Technique training!!Understand the fight, flight, or freeze stress response in children, how to help, and ease your own stress. Don't forget to sign up for a Tucker Turtle Technique training!
- Using social stories to help children understand when teachers change, or they must go to another classroom to meet ratios. Don't forget to sign up for a Tucker Turtle Technique training!
- Report any unusual happenings in your screening portal queue to your Early Intervention Specialist so
 we can make sure there is not an outage and save you time and energy. Don't forget to sign up for a Tucker
 Turtle Technique training!
- Register for **Social Emotional Literacy Trainings** on the ELCB Web Calendar.
- Recognize teachers who are participating in ongoing professional development.
- Engage families in your program and their children's early education. Re-defining family engagement.
- **Create strong bonds** with children and help them understand changes in schedules and routines using social stories and visual schedules.

Kate Watson - The Kid's Place

Michelle McMillon, the Infant Teacher at Kid's Place excitedly stated "I would like to nominate a teacher in the 1 1/2–2 year old classroom at the Toddler Program at The Kid's Place at IRCUMC. Her name is **Katie Watson** and I both respect and appreciate her as a teammate and colleague.

Miss Katie is an enthusiastic, energetic, kind, and motivated teacher to the young toddlers in her classroom. She began working at The Kid's Place in March of this year as the lead teacher in the room.

The children in my 1's room, move up to **Miss Katie's** 2's room, and they are blessed to have a kind, patient, loving teacher who welcomes & supports them to work through sad or difficult feelings, and she always shows concern and care. She is **patient and kind** even when it's difficult, while providing consistent boundaries and expectations appropriate to this age group. When her children see her through the window at times coming in to work, they light up and yell, or wave as if she can hear them outside.

When it comes to curriculum and providing interesting and fun experiences for her kids, Katie pulls out all the stops! She is very creative and seems to be able to make **something out of nothing when needed.** She takes time to plan out themes and lots of activities and crafts to support them. For example, when the theme was zoo animals, she posted pictures of different animals all around our church campus and then took them on an 'expedition'in the bye-bye buggies.



For a Christmas activity for a gingerbread theme, she took one of our playground houses, taped oversized candy decorations all over it, made gingerbread play dough, brought in bowls, spoons, cookie cutters, baking sheets, and the children played in and outside of the house and rolled, cut and 'baked' gingerbread cookies. They had a ball, and this is not unusual for Miss Katie.

Finally, Miss Katie is **a great team player**, always flexible, with a great attitude, even during challenging times. She is helpful, and takes on extra duties or additional children in her classroom. **What I really appreciate about Katie is that she always has a kind smile and a calm disposition**, even during difficult circumstances or when we are short staffed.

It is refreshing to have a fellow teacher who will look for the best in their children and coteachers, put in lots of energy and love into their work and children, and obviously enjoys being a teacher to these little toddlers.

All About Self-belonging and Why it Matters in the Classroom 06 Apr 2022 by Guest Blogger

Three reflections that will inspire you to become culturally responsive and make children feel seen, accepted, and recognized.

I moved to the United States years ago when I was a teenager. I felt confused, scared, and out of place in my new school. As soon as I learned English, I decided to stop speaking my native language to hide who I was. I thought that by hiding my identity people would not notice I was different and accept me.

Over the years I learned that being different is okay and that we are all different in beautiful ways. Recently, I decided to take action, share my story, and create awareness in the teaching community. I hope that by sharing my story I could touch the hearts of teachers and inspire them to create a learning environment that embraces diversity; a place where families and children can feel proud of who they are, the language they speak, the color of their skin, their food, culture, and traditions.

In an increasingly diverse society, it is imperative that teachers are prepared to work with families from different cultural backgrounds. Respecting a diverse group of children means recognizing that all of them are unique in their own ways. Promoting a sense of belonging is key to making families feel welcome and accepted. What can teachers do to support diversity? How can teachers make families feel proud of their home language, food, and traditions?

Reflection One: Why Belonging Matters in the Classroom

According to the UC Berkeley article, **"When students experience a sense of belonging in a learning environment, there are both immediate and long-term positive consequences for their academic performance and well-being."** It also indicates that when students don't feel a sense of belonging, they can become disconnected from their learning environment. It highlights that creating a sense of belonging potentially benefits students from marginalized and stigmatized groups, such as African American, Latino, Native American, first-generation immigrants, and financially stressed students.

This last statement empowers me to create awareness of being culturally responsive and provide opportunities for all students. How do I know my students feel accepted, valued, and seen in my classroom?

Reflection Two: How to Integrate the Culture of the Students in the Curriculum

Families come in different forms, shapes, and structures. Families have unique ideas, values, beliefs, and culture. When I enroll my children in a new program or school, I expect them to feel welcome and loved. As a parent, I will feel very touched if my son's teachers want to know more about my culture, language, and customs.

We know that children need a safe, loving, and positive environment to feel secure. Teachers demonstrate positive behaviors by engaging in meaningful and caring interactions with families/children. Let's think about other possibilities...


Reflective Questions:

- How am I promoting a sense of belonging?
- Am I taking into consideration the culture of the family, the language they speak, and their traditions?
- Do I have a protocol or tool that encourages parents to share their culture and embrace culturally diverse families?

Reflection Three: Does Representation in the Learning Environment Matter?

I'm the mother to three young boys. When I read books to them they pick a character that they identify with. They say, "I'm him." They even argue over who gets to be what character. I notice they look for characters that look like them, their skin color, body type, and other traits. Representation in books, images, materials, and media plays an important role in children's development and self-esteem. The characters provide a narrative that teaches them about their world.

Do I select books, materials, and images that represent my students' ethnicities? Do the books, materials, and images promote a positive image of their culture?

Representation plays an important factor in making children feel that their language and culture is appreciated and accepted in their learning community. When selecting books, materials, and images for my classroom, do students have mirrors (opportunities to see themselves and others in these resources)?

Focus on CLASS - Observable interactions

Using Open-Ended Prompts to Deepen Language Modeling Interactions 20 Dec 2022 by Marla Read Capper

Open-ended prompts are questions or statements that support children's verbal and

nonverbal communication. The purpose of open-ended prompts is to encourage extended responses, which promote children's language development by meeting children where they are. To encourage optimal language growth for all children, educators tailor open-ended prompts to meet individual needs. For example, educators may need to provide more time and support for children to process information and then respond as they are able. The complexity of prompts should be based on children's readiness levels and communication skills.

Why is it important to use open-ended prompts with children?

It's important for educators to ask children open-ended questions and statements like, "Tell me more about your drawing" or "What are you doing this weekend?" because they invite children to use more than one word in their response. Open-ended prompts are an important strategy that educators can use with children to open the dialogue and extend conversation, providing opportunities for children to practice language. Effective questions such as, "What is your favorite...? or "Tell me about...?" not only encourage back-and-forth exchanges and develop communication skills, but they can also offer valuable information about children.

How can educators grow their Language Modeling interactions by using ended prompts?

Consider the frequency, depth, and duration of the educator-child interactions.

- Frequency-the number of times the behaviors or interactions occur
- Depth-the impact of the interaction on the child.
- Duration-the length of an interaction and whether it is short-lived or sustained.

Meet students where they are and individualize prompts.

- Promote language by asking open-ended questions that are differentiated based on children's language abilities and communication skills.
- Use verbal and nonverbal cues
- Communicate in the home language, if possible.
- Consider the wait time so that children can fully respond before moving on.
- Use strategies to encourage children to engage in conversations with one another as they answer the open-ended prompts.

When should educators ask open-ended prompts?

All day long! Ideally, educators and children should participate in back-and-forth conversations all day. Open-ended questions or statements can lead to longer conversations while children are arriving in the morning and getting settled. It also can lead to dialogues between students, which can be helpful during arrival when there are only a few students in the room and teachers juggle managerial tasks.





ACTIVITY PLANS

By acknowledging children's feelings, we help them to understand those feelings and the emotions they give rise to.

With Practice children will learn skills to manage emotions which in turn promotes self regulation.



Materials Needed

- The book: When Sophie Gets Angry---Really, Really Angry by Molly Bang
- Bubbles and wand to inhale deeply and exhale slowly
- · Pinwheel to inhale deeply and exhale slowly (make it turn for a long time)
- Large star cut out (green arrows going up to each point instructing the child to inhale deeply as he
 uses his finger to trace that part of the star, blue arrows going down each point signaling that the
 child should exhale while tracing that part of the star with his finger)
- · Crayons and paper to color a picture about how they are feeling
- Sensory Bottle to slowly tip and watch
- Zen Garden (covered container filled with sand, stones, and a small rake or fork)
- Play dough to kneed and roll
- Small stuffed animal (children may lay on the floor, place the animal on their tummy and breathe deeply to make the animal move up and down)
- Beanbag, large pillow, soft chair, or small mat
 Pictures of animal stretches see examples below:
 - o Cat On all fours, tuck your chin into your chest and round your back o Cow - On all fours, look up, arch your back
 - o cow on all lours, look up, arch your back
 - o Flamingo Stand on one leg, bend your knee, place the sole of your foot on your inner thigh, and balance



Checking for Understanding

Children will demonstrate their understanding of the lesson by, sharing something that makes them angry or upset and practicing each "calm down activity."

Scaffolding

- If children have difficulty thinking about situations that make them angry or upset, assist them by providing possible scenarios.
- Walk the children through each activity, providing modeling and assistance as necessary.

Extensions

- Create a classroom book, When Miss 's Class Gets Calm--Really, Really Calm. Invite each child to draw a picture of something they like to do to help them calm down.
- Practice a variety of deep breathing, stretches, and relaxation exercises during group time.

It is important for children to have opportunities to talk about their feelings and emotions.

Remember... a "Calm Down Corner" is not a "Time-out" corner. Your children should regard it as a safe and positive space in the classroom.
